ENACTED by the National Assembly of the Federal Republic of Nigeria as follows:

15	(b) Any physical or mental incapacity, which in the opinion of the
16	Council and medical advice, considers to be such as to render the person
17	concerned unfit to continue to hold his office;
18	(c) Conduct of a scandalous or other disgraceful nature, which the
19	Council considers to be such as to render the person concerned unfit to continue
20	to hold his office; or
21	(d) Conduct which the Council considers to be such as to constitute
22	failure or inability of the person concerned to perform the functions of his
23	office or to comply with the terms and conditions of his service; or
24	(e) Conduct which the Council considers to be generally of such
25	nature as to render the continued appointment or service of the person
26	concerned as prejudicial or detrimental to the interest of the University.
27	(5) Any person suspended pursuant to sub-sections (2) or (3) of this
28	section, shall be on half pay and the Council shall, before the expiration of three
29	months of such suspension, consider the case against that person and come to a

2	what terms, including the proportion of his emoluments to be paid to him;
3	(b) Whether to reinstate such person, in which case the Council
4	shall restore his full emoluments to him with effect from the date of
5	suspension;
6	(c) Whether to terminate the appointment of such person, which in
7	 the circumstance shall not be entitled to the proportion of his emoluments
8	withheld during the period of suspension; or
9	 (d) Whether to take such lesser disciplinary action against the
10	person, which include the restoration of such proportion of his emoluments
11	withheld during suspension or as the Council may determine.
12	(6) Where the Council, pursuant to this Section, decides to
13	continue the person's suspension or take further disciplinary action against
14	the person, the Council shall before the expiration of three months of such
15	decision, come to a final determination of the case against the person.
16	(7) It shall be the duty of the person by whom an instrument of
17	removal is signed pursuant to this Section, to make effort to cause a copy of
18	the instrument to be served as soon as reasonably practicable on the person
19	to whom it relates.
20	(8) Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, nothing in the

16	(a) The Vice-Chancellor;

18	(c) The persons severally in charge of the branches of the school;
19	(d) Such of the teachers assigned to the school and having the
20	prescribed qualifications as the board may determine; and
21	(e) Such persons, whether or not members of the University, as the
22	Board may determine with the approval of the Senate.
23	(3) The quorum of any board meeting shall be eight members or
24	one quarter, whichever is greater, of the members for the time being of the

26	by regulations in that behalf, the board may regulate its own procedure.
27	Dean of the School
28	21(1) The board of each school shall, at a meeting in the last term
29	of any academic year in which the term of office of the Dean expires,
30	nominate one of its members, being one of the professors assigned to that

ĺ	teaching unit, for appointment by the Senate as Dean of the school.
2	(2) The person appointed under sub-paragraph (I) of Paragraph 8,
3	shall act as Dean of the school and chairman at all meetings of the school board
1	when he is present and shall be a member of all committees and other boards

5	(3) The Dean shall hold office for two years and shall be eligible for

26	Selection of Director of Works
27	22(1) Where a vacancy occurs in the office of the Director of Works
28	a selection board shall be constituted by the Council which shall consist of:

3	(d) The selection board, after making such inquiries as it thinks fit,

6	(4) For other academic posts, a selection board, with power to
7	appoint, shall consist of-
8	(a) The Vice-Chancellor;
9	(b) Four members appointed by the Senate, at least two of whom shall
10	be members of the Senate, while the other two members shall be professional
11	peers in the professional area in which an appointment is to be considered;
12	(c) Where the office is justifiable at the University, the Vice-
13	Chancellor of the University;
14	(d) Where the post is within a school, institute or other teaching unit of
15	the University, the Dean of the school or the teaching unit or the director of the
16	institute, as the case may be: and
17	(e) Such other persons not exceeding two in number, deemed capable
18	of helping the board in assessing both the professional and academic suitability
19	of a candidate under consideration, as the Senate may from time to time
20	appoint.
21	(5) All appointments to senior library posts shall be made in the same
22	way as equivalent appointments in the academic cadre and for all such posts
23	other than that of the Librarian, the Librarian shall be a member of the selection
24	board.
25	(6) Boards of selection may interview candidates directly or consider
26	the reports of interviewing panels and shall in addition, in the case of
2,7	professorships, associate professorships, readerships or equivalent post,
28	consider the reports of external assessors relevant to the area in which the

1	Appointment of administrative and professional staff
2	25(1) The Administrative and professional staff of the University
3	other than principal officers, shall be appointed by the Councilor on its
4	behalf by the Vice-Chancellor or the Registrar in accordance with
5	delegation of any powers made by the Council in that behalf.
6	(2) In the case of administrative or professional staffs that have
7	close and important contacts with the academic staff, the Senate or its
8	representative shall participate in the selection process.
9	FOURTH SCHEDULE
10	Transitional provisions as to property within the
11	Contemplation of this Act
12	1. Agreements, contracts, deeds and other instruments to which
13	the College was party to, shall subject to any necessary modification, have
14	effect as if the University had been a party thereto in place of the College.
15	2. Documents not falling within sub-paragraph (1) of this
16	Paragraph, including enactments, which refer, whether specifically or
17	generally, to the provisional council, shall be construed in accordance with
18	that sub-paragraph so far as applicable.
19	3. Any legal proceedings or application relating to any authority
20	pending or against the College, may be continued by or against the
21	University.
22	Registration of transfers
23	4. Where there is a law in force at the place where any property
24	transferred by this Act is situated, which provides for the registration of
25	transfers of property of the kind in question, whether by reference to an
26	instrument of transfer or otherwise, the law shall, so far as it provides for
27	alterations of a register, but not for avoidance of transfers, the payment of
28	fees shall apply to the modifications required under this paragraph.
29	5. It shall be the duty of the body to which any property is
20	transferred by this Act to make available to the transferee necessary

1	particulars of such transfer to the proper officer of the registration authority and
2	of that officer to register the transfer accordingly.
3	Transfer of Functions
4	6. The first meeting of the Council shall be convened by the Pro-
5	Chancellor on such date in such manner as he may determine.
6	7. Persons who were members of the College Council shall be deemed
7	to constitute the Council of the University until the date when a new Council
8	will be constituted by the University.
9	8. The first meeting of the Senate as constituted by this Act shall be
10	convened by the Vice-Chancellor on such date and in such manner as he may
11	determine.
12	9. Any person, who is a member of the Council of the College of
13	Education Nsugbe before the coming into force of this Act, shall be deemed to
14	constitute the Senate of the University until the date when the Senate as
15	provided for Section 9 of this Act have been duly constituted.
16	10. Subject to any statutory instruments made by the Senate pursuant
17	to this Act, the schools, school boards and students of the College of Education
18	Nsugbe before the coming into force of this Act, shall on that day become
19	schools, school boards and students of the Federal University of Education
20	Nsugbe as may be constituted by this Act.
21	11. Persons who were Deans or associate Deans of schools or
22	members of any school boards shall continue to be Deans or associate Deans or
23	become members of the corresponding school boards, until new appointments
24	are made in pursuance of the statutes.
25	12. Any person who was a member of staff of the College as
26	established or was otherwise employed by the Council of the College, shall
27	become the holder of an appointment at the University with the status
28	designation and functions which correspond with his status as a staff of the
29	University.

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM

This Bill seeks to establish Federal University of Education, Nsugbe to provide training and teaching instruction in every aspect of Education and such other fields of applied learning relevant to the needs of the development of Education in Nigeria, matters of administration and discipline of students.
