Commencement

BE IT ENACTED by the National Assembly of the Federal Republic of Nigeria as follows:

1. The Criminal Code Act, Cap 38, Laws of the Federation of Nigeria, 2004 (herein after referred to as the "Principal Act") is amended as set out below.

Amendment of the Principal Act

- 2. Section 61, Part 1 to the Schedule of the Principal Act is deleted and substituted with a new section as follows:
- "61 (1) Any person who advisedly or otherwise does any unlawful act calculated to interfere with the free exercise by the President or Vice President, Governor or Deputy Governor of the duties or authority of his office or with the free exercise by a member of the Federal Executive Council, or a State Executive Council of his duties as such member, is guilty of a felony, and is liable to imprisonment for three years.
- 12 (2) Any person who advisedly or otherwise does any unlawful act
 13 calculated to interfere with the free exercise by the Senate President or
 14 Deputy Senate President or Senate Principal Officers or Senate Committees
 15 or a Senator or Speaker of the House of Representatives or Deputy Speaker
 16 of the House of Representatives or House Principal Officers or House
 17 Committees or a Member of the House of Representatives of his legislative
 18 business or duties or authority of his office is guilty of a felony, and is liable

1 (3) The offender cannot be arrested without warrant.

2 (4) A prosecution for an offence under this Section shall not be instituted except by or with the consent of law officer in the office of the Attorney General of the Federation."

Citation 5 3. This Bill may be cited as the Criminal Code Act (Amendment) 6 Bill, 2018.

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM

The Bill seeks to criminalize any interference with the free exercise of the legislative duties and authority of the Senate or the House of Representatives. The Bill also extended the executive protection to the Vice President and a Deputy Governor.
