AN ACT TO AMEND THE FEDERAL ROAD SAFETY COMMISSION (ESTABLISHMENT) ACT 2007, TO MAKE PROVISIONS FOR LICENCING PROCEDURE, REGULATION OF DRIVING SCHOOLS, AND TO ALSO AMEND THE THIRD SCHEDULE AND FOR RELATED MATTERS 2016

THE THIRD SCHEDULE AND FOR RELATED MATTERS 2016 Sponsored by Hon. Ehiozuwa Johnson Agbonayinma Commencement ENACTED by the National Assembly of the Federal Republic of Nigeria as follows: 1. The Federal Road Safety Commission (Establishment) Act Cap. Act 2007 LFN 2007 hereinafter referred to as the Principal Act is amended as set out below: Section 10 of the Principal Act is amended by inserting immediately after 3 subsection (1) the following new subsection (2) and re-arranging the 4 subsequent subsections accordingly. 2. Section 10 of the Principal Act is amended by inserting a New 6 Amendment of Section 10 Sub-Rule 2 (d) as follows: (d) Ensuring that All Driving Schools are certified by the Federal 9 Road Safety Commission (FRSC) irrespective of it Registration at the 10 Corporate Affairs Commission (CAC) under this Bill. 11 Notwithstanding the provisions of any other enactment, the Corps shall to 12 the exclusion of any other authority be the sole authority responsible for: 13 (a) issuing driver's licence of all categories, 14 (b) developing the curriculum for drivers' education, 15 (c) testing of applicants for driver's licence, 16 (d) testing applicant's visual and hearing acuity; 17 (e) capturing applicants digital photographic image; 18 (f) processing all matters necessary and incidental to granting an 19 application for a driver's licence.

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1	The Principal Act is amended by inserting immediately after section 10 the
2	following new section 11 and re-arranging the subsequent sections
3	accordingly.
4	(1) An applicant for a driver's licence shall be required to:
5	(a) undertake a compulsory driver education in an accredited and
6	approved driving school to provide the applicant with sufficient education to
7	guarantee that he possesses the necessary attitudes, knowledge and abilities as
8	may be specified in the driving curriculum;
9	(b) pass the theoretical and practical test conducted by a duly
10	authorised officer of the Corps to verify that the applicant has attained the level
11	of competence specified in the driving curriculum;
12	(2) without prejudice to the power of the Commission to make
13	regulations under this Act, the compulsory driver education, practical and
14	theoretical tests specified in this section shall be in substantial compliance with
15	the provisions of the third schedule to this Act.
16	(3) The Corps shall not issue a driver's licence to an applicant unless
17	the applicant further undertakes the following tests conducted by a duly
18	authorised officer of the Corps:
19	(a) Sight (vision acuity test);
20	(b) hearing acuity test;
21	(c) general medical fitness test;
22	(d) written/oral test.
23	(4) The Corps shall duly certify any applicant that passes any of the
24	tests conducted by a duly authorised officer of the Corps pursuant to this
25	section.
26	(5) The minimum requirement for a driver's licence shall be the first
27	school leaving certificate or its equivalent.
28	(6) The Corp shall maintain a driving Data record of all drivers duly
29	issued with a driver's licence.

(7) Nothing in this Act shall be construed as empowering the Corps to

1	establish driving schools and also certified and regulate all Driving Schools.

20	(4) Any officer of the Corps who violates the provisions of

	27	Part I - Compulsory Driver Education:
	28	1(1) The applicant must have a thorough knowledge of the Highway
	29	Code and motoring laws as well as a thorough understanding of the
	30	responsibilities of a driver. This means that the student must have real concern

1	for the safety of him-/herself, pedestrians and other road users.	
2	The applicant is also informed to make sure that the instructor fully covers	
3	the curriculum. Listed below are the eight items that the student needs to	
4	attend to and show that he or she is able to perform in order to pass the	
5	practical test.	
6	(b) Car controls, equipment and components	
7	The applicant must understand the function of the accelerator, clutch, gears,	
8	footbrake, handbrake and steering. The applicant must also be able to use	
9	these competently, understand the meaning of the gauges and other displays	
10	on the instrumental panel and know the function of other controls and	
11	switches in the car that have a bearing on road safety and use them	
12	competently. Further the applicant must be able to carry out routine safety	
13	checks concerning oil and coolant levels, tyre pressure, steering and brakes.	
14	(b) Road user behavior	
15	(i) The applicant must know the most common causes of accidents;	
16	know which road users are most at risk and how to reduce that risk. The	
17	applicant must also know the rules, risks and effects of drinking and driving	
18	and know the effect of fatigue, illness and drugs on driving performance;	
19	(ii) The applicant must also be aware of any age-related problems	
20	among other road users, especially among children, teenagers and the	
21	elderly. In addition he or she has to be alert and able to anticipate the likely	
22	actions of other road users and be able to take appropriate precautions and be	
23	aware that courtesy and consideration towards other road users are essential	
24	for safe driving.	
25	A New (b) iii is inserted as follows:	Amendment of Third Schedule
26	(iii) The condition and age limit for a trailer driver shall be between	Part 1 (1) (b)
27	35 to 60 years, this is considered to be a mature and responsible age for	
28	anyone to drive a trailer on the highway.	
29	(c) Vehicle characteristics:	
30	(i) The applicant must know the important principles concerning	

1	braking distance and road holding under various road and weather conditions;
2	(ii) The applicant must also know the handling characteristics of other
3	vehicles with regard to stability, speed, braking and maneuverability. In
4	addition the applicant must be able to assess the risks caused by the
5	characteristics of other vehicles and suggest precautions that can be taken and
6	know that some vehicles are less easily seen than others.
7	(d) Road and weather conditions:
8	(i) The applicant must know the particular hazards in both dayligh
9	and the dark and on different types of roads. It's important that the applican
10	gains driving experience on urban and higher speed roads (not on highways) in
11	both daylight and the dark and know which road surfaces provide the better o
12	poorer grip when braking;
13	(ii) The applicant must also know the hazards caused by bad weathe
14	and be able to assess the risks caused by road and traffic conditions, be aware o
15	how the conditions may cause others to drive unsafely, and be able to take
16	appropriate precautions.
17	(e) Traffic signs, rules and regulations:
18	The applicant must have sound knowledge of the meaning of traffic signs and
19	road markings, for example speed limits, parking restrictions and zebra and
20	pelican crossings.
21	(f) Car control and road procedure:
22	The applicant must have the knowledge and skills to carry out the following
<b>3</b> 3	tool a safely and competently practicing the proper use of mirrors, observation
24	and signals:
25	(i) Take the necessary precautions before getting in or out of the
26	vehicle;
27	(ii) Before starting the engine, carry out safety checks on doors, sea
28	and head restraints, seat belts and mirrors;
29	(iii) Start the engine and move off;
30	(iv) Select the correct road position for normal driving;

1	(v) Use proper observation in all traffic conditions;
2	(vi) Drive at speed suitable for road and traffic conditions;
3	(vii) Change gear promptly to all risks;
4	(viii) Change traffic lanes;
5	(ix) Pass stationary vehicles;
6	(x) Meet, overtake and cross the path of other vehicles;
7	(xi) Turn right and left at junctions, including crossroads and
8	roundabouts;
9	(xii) Drive ahead at crossroads and roundabouts;
10	(xiii) Keep a safe separation distance when following other traffic;
11	(xiv) Act correctly at pedestrian crossings;
12	(xv) Show proper regard for the safety of other road users with

15	dual carriageways, keeping up with the flow of the traffic where it is safe and
16	proper to do so;
17	(xvii) Comply with traffic regulations and traffic signals given by
18	the police, traffic wardens and other road users;
19	(xviii) Stop the vehicle safely, normally and in an emergency,
20	without locking the wheels;
21	(xix) Turn the vehicle in the road to face the opposite way using the
22	forward and reverse gears;
23	(xx) Reverse the vehicle into a side road keeping reasonably close
24	to the kerb;
25	(xxi) Parallel parking while driving in a reverse gear;
26	(xxii) Park the vehicle in a multi-storey car park or other parking
27	bay, on the level, uphill and downhill, both in forward and reverse
28	directions;
29	(xxiii) Cross all types of railway crossings.

	Part II The Theoretical Test:
	2(1) The theoretical test should be divided into two parts. On
	should be a multiple-choice section, and the test-taker selects the answers. The
	multiple-choice section should contain at least 35 test items to be answered in
	90 minutes. The test-taker must score at least 86% in order to pass this part o
	the test.
	(2) The theoretical test shall include a test of hazard perception skills
	and after the multiple-choice section there is a15- minute break before the
	hazard perception section starts. This should consists of 14 video clips, each
	lasting about one minute, which feature real road scenes and developing
	hazards of various types. There should be at least a total of 15 score-able
	hazards in the test and the student is assessed on the amount of time needed to
	spot the hazards.
	(3) The sooner the test-taker responds, the higher the score will be the
	highest possible score is five points. Thirteen of the clips should contain one
	score-able hazard, and one clip contains two hazards. The test-taker should
	have only one chance to respond to the hazard perception clips. Those applying
	for fresh driving license must score at least 75 % in order to pass the hazard
	perception section.

	probationary period starts. In order to be allowed to undergo the practical
ļ.	test the applicant must pass the theoretical test.
	(2) The practical test should last for approximately 60 minutes and
	starts with an eyesight test. If the applicant is able to pass this test, i.e. able to
,	read a car number plate in good daylight at 67 feet, approximately 20 metres,
3	he or she is allowed to undergo the driving test. Then the applicant is
)	required to drive around one of a number of set driving test routes which
0	incorporate a range of different hazards and driving situations, generally
1	representative of normal driving conditions. During the test the examiner
2	should direct the applicant around the route whilst assessing and marking all
3	aspects of the applicant's performance. Each examiner is required to use one
4	of a number of sets and approved driving test routes. Each test centre
. 5	normally should use about 20 test routes and examiners are required to use
6	each of those in equal proportion to the rest.
7	(3) Driving instructors are encouraged to accompany their students
8	on the test or to listen to the examiner's debriefing at the end of the session.
9	Apart from general driving, the applicant will be asked to carry out two of
20	the following manoeuvres during the test:
21	(a) Reversing around a corner;
22	(b) Turning in the road;
23	(c) Reverse parking.
24	(4) The applicant may also be asked to carry out an emergency stop
25	exercise. If the test-taker commits a number of different faults, he or she
26	should fail the test.
27	(5)There are three categories of fault:
28	(a) Dangerous fault - involving actual danger;
29	(b) Serious fault - potentially dangerous or serious errors;
30	(c) Driving fault - a significant error in driving technique or

- incorrect reaction to a situation not assessed as serious.
- (6)If the applicant commits one dangerous fault, one serious fault or
- 3 more than 15 driving faults, this should result in failure. If the test-taker passes
- 4 the test he or she shall be on probation for two years. If the driver gets six or
- 5 more penalty points during this time, he or she shall lose the license. Then he or
  - she has to re-apply for a provisional license and take all of the tests again.
  - 7 (7) The test-taker should receive the test results and feedback
  - 8 information within 30 minutes after having finished the test. Feedback is given
  - on any multiple-choice items answered incorrectly. In order to be approved the
  - 10 test-taker has to pass both parts of the test. If approved the test-taker will
  - 11 receive a Theory Test Pass certificate that is valid for two years. If the test-taker
  - has not passed the practical test within these two years, he or she will have to
  - 13 retake the theoretical test.

## EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM

This Bill seeks to Amend the Federal Road Safety Commission (Establishment) Act to Grant Exclusive Powers to the Federal Road Safety Corps to issue Driver's Licences, Regulate the Activities of All Driving Schools, as well as Make Provisions for the licensing to ensure safety of lives on the highways, to meet International Best Standard.
