1	PART I — ESTABLISHMENT, CONSTITUTION AND FUNCTIONS OF	
2	Federal University, Wukari	
3	1.—(1) There is established the Federal University, Wukari (in this	Establishment and Objects of the
4	Act referred to as "the University")	Federal University Wuekari
5	(2) The University—	
6	(a) shall be a body corporate with perpetual succession and a	
7	common seal; and	
8	(b) may sue or be sued in its corporate name.

19	or otherwise deal with or dispose of movable and immovable property

21	(i) accept gifts, legacies and donations, but without obligation to
22	accept the same for a particular purpose unless it approves the terms and
23	conditions attaching thereto;
24	(j) enter into contracts, establish trusts, act as trustee, solely or
25	jointly with any other person, and employ and act through agents;
26	(k) erect, provide, equip and maintain libraries, laboratories,
27	lecture halls, halls of residence, refectories, sports grounds, playing fields
28	and other buildings or things necessary, suitable or convenient for any of the
29	objects of the University;
30	(l) hold public lectures and undertake printing, publishing and

- (m) subject to any limitations or conditions imposed by Statute, to invest any moneys appertaining to the University by law of endorsement, whether for general or special purposes, and such other moneys as may not be immediately required for current expenditure, in any investments or securities or in the purchase or improvement of land, with power from time to time to vary any such investments and to deposit any moneys for the time being un-invested with any bank on deposit or current account;
- (n) borrow, whether on interest or not, and if need be, upon the security of any or all of the property movable or immovable of the University, such moneys as the Council may from time to time in its discretion find necessary or expedient to borrow or to guarantee any loan, advances or credit facilities;
 - (o) make gifts for any charitable purpose;
- (p) do anything which it is authorized or required by this Act or by any other Statute to do; and
 - (q) do all such acts or things, whether or not incidental to the foregoing powers, as may advance the objects of the University.
 - (2) Subject to the provisions of this Act and of the Statutes made thereunder and without prejudice to Section 9 (2) of this Act, the powers conferred on the University by subsection (1) of this section shall be exercisable on behalf of the University by the Council or by the Senate or in any other manner which may be authorized by this Act.

Functions of the Chancellor and Pro-Chancellor

- **5.**—(1) The Chancellor shalt in relation to the University, take precedence before all other members of the University, and when he is present shall preside at all meetings of convocation held for conferring degrees.
- (2) The Pro-Chancellor shall, in relation to the University, take precedence before all other members of the University except the Chancellor, and except for the Vice Chancellor when acting as Chairman of Congregation or Convocation, and the Pro-Chancellor shalt when he is present, be the

4	(5) Subject to this Act and the Statutes, the Council and the Finance
5	and General Purposes Committee may each make rules for the purpose of
6	exercising any of their respective functions or of regulating their own
7	procedure.
8	(6) Rules made under subsection (S) of this section by the Finance and
9	General Purposes Committee shall not come into force unless approved by the
10	Council, and where any rule so made by the Committee conflict with any
11	directions given by the Council (whether before or after the coming into force
12	of the rules in question), the direction of the Council shall prevail.
13	(7) There shall be paid to the members of the Council, the Finance and
14	General Purposes Committee and of any other committee set up by the
15	Council, allowances in respect of travelling and other reasonable expenses, at
16	such rates as may from time to time be fixed by extant government circulars.
17	(8) The Council shall meet as and when necessary for the
18	performance of its functions under this Act, and shall meet at least four times
19	every year.
20	(9) If required in writing by any five members of the Council, the
21	Chairman shall within twenty-eight days after the receipt of such request call a
22	meeting of the Council:
23	PROVIDED that if after 28 days of the receipt or delivering to him of
24	such request, the chairman fails or neglects to call a meeting, the Registrar shall
25	within 14 days thereof, cause a meeting of the Council to be convened for that
26	purpose. The request shall specify the business to be considered at the meeting
27	and no business not so specified shall be transacted at that meeting.
28	8.—(1) Subject to section 5 of this Act and subsections (3) and (4) of

4	(2) Without prejudice to the generality of the provisions of
5	subsection (l) of this section, it shall in particular be the function of the
6	Senate to make provision for the —
7	(a) establishment, organization and control of campuses, colleges,
8	faculties, departments, schools, institutes and other teaching and research
9	units of the University, and the allocation of responsibility for different
10	branches of learning;
11	(b) organization and control of courses of study in the University
12	and of the examinations held in conjunction with those courses, including
13	the appointment of examiners, both internal and external;
14	(c) award of degrees, and such other qualifications as may be
15	prescribed, in connection with examinations conducted by the University;
16	(d) making of recommendations to the Council with respect to the
17	award to any person of an honorary fellowship or honorary degree or the title
18	of professor emeritus;
19	(e) establishment, organization and control of halls of residence
20	and similar institutions in the University;
21	(f) supervision of the welfare of students in the University and the
22	regulation of their conduct;
23	(g) granting of fellowships, scholarships, prizes and similar awards
24	in so far as the awards are within the control of the University; and
25	(h) determination of what description of dress shall be academic
26	dress for the purposes of the University, and regulating the use of academic
27	dress.
28	(3) The Senate shall not establish any new campus, college,
29	faculty, department, school, institute or other teaching and research units of
30	the University, or any hall of residence or similar institution at the

	1	University without the approval of the Council.
	2	(4) (a) Subject to this Act and the Statutes, the Senate may make
	3	regulations for the purpose of exercising any function conferred on it either by
	4	the provisions of this section or for the purpose of providing for any matter for
	5	which provision by regulation is authorized or required by this Act or by
	6	Statute;
	7	(b) The Senate shall, by regulation, provide that at least one of the
	8	persons appointed as examiners at each final or professional examination held
	9	in conjunction with any course of study in the University is not a teacher at th-
	10	University but is a teacher at the branch of learning to which the course relates
	11	in some other university of high repute.
	12	(5) Subject to a right of appeal to the Council from a decision of the
	13	Senate under this subsection, the Senate may deprive any person of any degree,
	14	diploma or other award of the University which has been conferred on him if
	15	after due enquiry he is shown to have been guilty of any dishonourable or
	16	scandalous conduct in gaining admission into the University or obtaining that
	17	award.
Functions of the	18	9.—(1) The Vice-Chancellor shall, in relation to the University, take
Vice-Chancellor	19	precedence before all other members of the University except the Chancellor
	20	and, subject to section 5 of this Act, the Pro-Chancellor and any other person
	21	for the time being acting as Chairman of the Council.
	22	(2) Subject to the provisions of this Act, the Vice-Chancellor shall
	23	have general function, in addition to any other functions conferred on him by
	24	this Act or otherwise, of directing the activities of the University, and shall to
	25	the exclusion of any other person or authority be the chief executive and
	26	academic officer of the University and ex-officio Chairman of the Senate.

6	11.—(1) Subject to this Act, the University may make Statutes for	Power of the

10	(b) specifying and regulating the powers and duties of any	
11	authority of the University, and regulating any other matter connected with	
12	the University or any of its authorities;	
13	(c) regulating the admission of students where it is done by the	
14	University, and their discipline and welfare;	
15	(d) determining whether any particular matter is to be treated as an	
16	academic or non-academic matter for the purposes of this Act and of any	
17	Statute, regulation or other instrument made there-under; and	
18	(e) making provision for other matters for which provision by	
19	Statute is authorized or required by this Act.	
20	(2) Subject to section 25 (6) of this Act, the Interpretation Act shall	
21	apply in relation to any Statute made under this section as it applies to a	
22	subsidiary instrument within the meaning of section 27 (1) of that Act.	
23	(3) The Statute contained in the Third Schedule to this Act shall be	
24	deemed to have come into force on the commencement of this Act and shall	
25	be deemed to have been made under this section by the University.	
26	(4) The power to make Statute conferred by this section shall not be	
27	prejudiced or limited in any way by reason of the inclusion or omission of	
28	any matter in or from the Statute contained in the Third Schedule to this Act	
29	or any subsequent Statute.	

Mode of exercising the power to make Statutes	1	12.—(1) The power of the University to make Statutes shall be
	2	exercised in accordance with the provisions of this section.
	3	(2) A proposed Statute shall not have the force of law until it has been
	4	approved at a meeting of the —
	5	(a) Senate, by the votes of not less than two thirds of the members
	6	present and voting; and
	7	(b) Council by the votes of not less than two thirds of the members
	8	present and voting.
	9	(3) A proposed Statute may originate either in the Senate or Council,
	10	and may be approved as required by subsection (2) of this section by both
	11	bodies in no particular order.
	12	(4) A Statute which —
	13	(a) makes provision for or alters the composition or constitution of the
	14	Council, the Senate or any other authority of the University; or
	15	(b) provides for the establishment of a new campus or college or for
	16	the amendment or revocation of any Statute whereby a campus or college is
	17	established;
	18	shall not come into operation unless it has been approved by the Visitor.
	19	(5) For the purpose of section 2 (2) of the Interpretation Act, a Statute
	20	shall be treated as being made on the date on which it is approved by the
	21	Council and the Senate in accordance with subsection (3) of this section or in
	22	the case of a Statute falling within subsection (4) of this section, on the date on
	23	which it is approved by the President.
Proof of Statute	24	13. A Statute may be proved in any court by the production of a copy
	25	thereof bearing or having affixed to it a certificate signed by the Vice-
	26	Chancellor or the Registrar to the effect that the copy is a true copy of a Statute
	27	of that University.
Power to decide the meaning of	28	14.—(1) In the event of any doubt or dispute arising at any time as to
Statute	29	the meaning of any provision of a Statute, the matter may be referred to the

the meaning of any provision of a Statute, the matter may be referred to the

1	Visitor, who shall take such advice and make such decision thereon as he	
2	deems fit.	
3	(2) The decision of the Visitor on any matter referred to him under

14	to any doubt or dispute as to whether any matter is, for the purposes of this	
15	Act, academic or a non-academic matter as they apply in relation to any such	
16	doubt or dispute as is mentioned in subsection (1) of this section, and	
17	accordingly the reference in subsection (2) of this section to any question as	
18	to the meaning of any provision of a statute shall include references to any	
19	question as to whether any matter is for the said purposes an academic or	
20	non-academic matter.

	7	of misconduct or inability to perform the functions of his office, the Council
	8	shall make a recommendation to that effect through the Minister to the Federal
	9	Executive Council and if the Federal Executive Council, after making such
	10	enquiries (if any) as may be considered necessary, approves the
	11	recommendation it may direct the removal of the member from office.
	12	(2) It shall be the duty of the Minister to use his best endeavours to
	13	cause a copy of the instrument embodying a direction under subsection (1) of
	14	this section to be served as soon as reasonably practicable on the person to
	15	whom it relates.
Removal and discipline of	16	17.—(1) If it appears to the Council that there are reasons for
Academic, Administrative and	17	believing that any person employed as a member of the academic,
Professional Staff	18	administrative or professional staff of the University, other than the Vice-
	19	Chancellor, should be removed from office or on grounds of misconduct or
	20	inability to perform the functions of his office Council shall—
	21	(a) give notice of those reasons to the person in question;
	22	(b) afford such person an opportunity of making representation in
	23	person on the matter to the Council; and
	24	(c) take a decision to terminate or not to terminate the appointment.
	25	(2) If the affected staff or any three members of the Council so request
	26	within a period of one month from the date of receipt of the notice of the
	27	Council's decision, the Council shall make arrangements for —
	28	(a) a joint committee of the Council and the Senate to review the
	29	matter and to report on it to the Council;
	30	(b) the person in question to be afforded an opportunity to appear

1	before and be heard by an investigating committee with respect to the
2	matter; and if the Council after considering the report of the investigating
3	committee, is satisfied that the person in question should be removed, the

6	(3) The Vice-Chancellor may, in a case of gross misconduct by a
7	$member\ of\ staff\ which\ in\ the\ opinion\ of\ the\ Vice-Chancellor\ is\ prejudicial\ to$
8	the interest of the University, suspend such member and any such
9	suspension shall immediately be reported to the Council.
10	(4) Any member of staff may be suspended from duty or his
11	appointment may be terminated by Council for a good cause and for the
12	purposes of this subsection "good cause" means —
13	(a) conviction for any offence which the Council considers to be
14	such as to render the person concerned unfit for the discharge of the
15	functions of his office;
16	(b) any physical or mental incapacity which the Council, after
17	obtaining medical advice, considers to be such as to render the person
18	concerned unfit to continue to hold office;
19	(c) conduct of a scandalous or disgraceful nature which the
20	Council considers to be such as to render the person concerned unfit to
21	continue to hold office; or
22	(d) conduct which the Council considers to be such as to constitute
23	failure or inability of the person concerned to discharge the functions of his
24	office or to comply with the terms and conditions of his service.
25	(5) Any person suspended pursuant to subsection (3) of this section
26	shall be on half pay and the Council shall before the expiration of a period of
27	three months from the date of such suspension consider the case against that
28	person and come to a decision as to whether to —
29	(a) continue such person's suspension and if so on what terms
30	(including the proportion of his emoluments to be paid to him);

	1	(b) reinstate such person in which case the Council shall restore his
	2	full emoluments with effect from the date of suspension;
	3	(c) terminate the appointment of the person concerned in which case
	4	such a person will not be entitled to the proportion of his emoluments withheld
	5	during the period of suspension; or
	6	(d) take such lesser disciplinary action against such person (including
	7	the restoration of such proportion of his emoluments that might have been
	8	withheld) as the Council may determine.
	9	(6) Where the Council, pursuant to this section, decides to continue a
	10	person's suspension or decides to take further disciplinary action against the
	11	person, the Council shall, before the expiration of three months from such
	12	decision come to a final determination in respect of the case concerning such a
	13	person.
	14	(7) It shall be the duty of the person by whom an instrument of
	15	removal is signed in pursuance of subsection (1) above to use his best
	16	endeavours to cause a copy of the instrument to be served as soon as reasonably
	17	practicable on the person to whom it relates.
	18	(8) Nothing in the foregoing provisions of this section shall prevent
	19	the Council from making regulations for the discipline of staff and workers of
	20	the University as may be appropriate.

12	$chairman\ at\ all\ meetings\ of\ the\ Faculty\ Board\ when\ he\ is\ present\ and\ he\ shall\ be$
13	a member of all committees and other boards appointed by the faculty.
14	(4) The Dean of a faculty shall exercise general superintendence over
15	the academic and administrative affairs of the faculty and it shall be the
16	function of the Dean to present to the convocation for the conferment of
17	Degrees, persons who have qualified for the Degrees of the University at
18	examinations held in the branches of learning for which responsibility is
19	allocated to that faculty.
20	(5) There shall be a committee to be known as the Committee of
21	Deans which shall consist of all the Deans of the several faculties and that
22	committee shall advise the Vice-Chancellor on all academic matters and on
23	particular matters referred to the Committee by the Senate.
24	(6) The Dean of a faculty may be removed from office for a good
25	cause by the Faculty Board after a vote would have been taken at a meeting of
26	the Board, and in the event of a vacancy occurring following the removal of the
27	Dean, an Acting Dean may be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor provided that
28	at the next faculty board meeting an election shall be held for a new Dean.
29	(7) In this article, "good cause" has the same meaning as in section 17
30	(4) of this Act.

1	Selection of Certain Principal and other key Officers
2	9.—(1) When a vacancy occurs in the Office of the Registrar,
3	Bursar, the University Librarian, Director of Works or Director of Health
4	Services, a Selection Board shall be constituted by the Council and shall
5	consist of—
6	(i) the Pro-Chancellor;
7	(ii) the Vice-chancellor;
8	(iii) two members appointed by the Council, not being members of
9	Senate; and
10	(iv) two members appointed by the Senate not being members of
11	Council.
12	(2) The Selection Board, after making such inquires as it thinks fit,
13	shall recommend a candidate to the Council for appointment to the vacant
14	office, and after considering the recommendation of the Board the Council
15	may make an appointment to that office.
16	(3) A person appointed to the office of Director of Works or
17	Director of Health Services shall hold office for such period and on such

19	Creation of Academic Post
20	10. Recommendation for the creation of posts other than those
21	mentioned in paragraph 9 of this Schedule shall be made by the Senate to the
22	Council through the Finance and General Purposes Committee.
23	Appointment of Academic Staff
24	11. Subject to this Act and the Statutes derived from it, the filling of
25	vacancies in academic posts (including newly created ones) shall be as
26	prescribed from time to time by Statutes.
27	Appointment of Administrative and Technical Staff
28	12.—(1) The administrative and technical staff of the University,
29	other than those mentioned in paragraph 9 of this schedule shall be
30	appointed by the Councilor on its behalf by the Vice-Chancellor or the

- 1 Registrar in accordance with any delegation of powers made by the Council in
- 2 that behalf.
- 3 (2) In the case of administrative or technical staff that has close and
- 4 important contacts with the academic staff, there shall be Senate participation
- 5 in the process of selection.

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM

(This memo does not form part of this Bill)

This Bill seeks to establish the Federal University, Wukari to ensure equity and access to tertiary education in the country. The University is a conventional university with restricted programmes and limited and focused faculties.
