AN ACT TO ESTABLISH THE MARITIME UNIVERSITY OF NIGERIA, OKERENKOKO AND FOR OTHER MATTERS CONNECTED THERETO

	BE IT ENACTED by the National Assembly of the Federal
	Republic of Nigeria as follows-
1	PART I - ESTABLISHMENT, CONSTITUTION AND FUNCTIONS OF MARITIME
2	UNIVERSITY OF NIGERIA
3	1(1) There is hereby established the Maritime University of
4	Nigeria.
5	(2) The University shall be a body corporate with perpetual
6	succession and a common seal and may sue or be sued in its corporate name.
7	(3) The objects of the University shall be -
8	(a) to encourage the advancement of learning and to hold out to all
9	persons without distinction of race, creed, sex or political conviction, the
10	opportunity of acquiring a higher education in technology;
11	(b) to develop and offer academic and professional programmes
12	leading to the award of diplomas, first degrees, post-graduate research and
13	higher degrees with emphasis on planning, adaptive, technical,
14	maintenance, developmental and productive skills in the engineering,
15	scientific, and allied professional disciplines relating to Maritime resources
16	with the aim of producing socially mature men and women with capability
17	not only to understand, use and adapt existing technologies in the maritime
18	industry, bu also to improve on them and develop new ones;
19	(c) to act as agents and catalysts, through post-graduate training,
20	research and innovation for the effective and economic utilisation,
	exploitation and conservation of the country's maritime resources;

(d) to offer to the general population particularly the maritime
industry, as a form of public service, the results of training and research and to
foster the practical applications of these results;
(e) to establish appropriate relationships with other national
institutions involved in training, research and development of technologies in
the maritime sector;
(f) to identify the technological problems and needs of the maritime
industry and to find solutions to them within the context of overall national
development;
(g) to provide and promote sound basic scientific training as a
foundation for the development of maritime technology and applied sciences,
taking into account indigenous cultures and the need to enhance national unity;
and
(h) to undertake any other activities appropriate for a maritime
university of the highest standard.
2(1) the University shall consist of-
(a) a Chancellor;
(b) a Pro-Chancellor and a Council;
(c) a Vice-Chancellor and a Senate;
(d) a body to be called Congregation;
(e) a body to be called Convocation;
(f) the campuses and colleges of the University;
(g) the colleges, institutes and other teaching and research units of the
University;
(h) the persons holding the offices constituted by the First Schedule to
this bill other than those mentioned in paragraphs (a) to (c) of this subsection;
(i) all graduates and undergraduates of the University; and all other
persons who are members of the university in accordance with provisions
made by statute in that behalf.

(2) The First Schedule to this Act shall have effect with respect to the

1	principal officers of each University therein mentioned.
2	(3) Subject to section 5 of this Act provision shall be made by statute with
3	respect to the constitution of the Council, the Senate, Congregation and
4	Convocation.
5	3 (1) For the carrying out of its objects as specified in section 1 of this Act,
6	the University shall have power-
7	(a) to establish such campuses, institutes, schools, extra-mural
8	departments and other teaching and research units within the University as
9	may from time to time be deemed necessary or desirable subject to the
10	approval of the National Universities Commission;
11	(b) to institute professorships, readerships or associate
12	professorships, lectureships, and other posts and offices and to make
13	appointments thereto;
14	(c) to institute and award fellowships, scholarships, exhibitions,
15	bursaries, medals, prizes and other titles, distinctions, awards and forms of
16	assistance;
17	(d) to provide for the discipline and welfare of members of the
18	University;
19	(e) to hold examinations and grant degrees, diplomas, certificates
20	and other distinctions to persons who have pursued a course of study
21	approved by the University and have satisfied such other requirements as the
22	University may lay down;
23	(f) to grant honorary degrees, fellowships or academic titles;
24	(g) to demand and receive from any student or any other person
25	attending the University for the purpose of instruction, such fees as the
26	University may from time to time determine subject to the overall directives
27	of the Minister;
28	(h) subject to section 19 of this Act, to acquire, hold, grant, charge
29	or otherwise deal with or dispose of movable and immovable property
30	wherever situate;

1	(i) to accept gifts, legacies and donations, but without obligation
2	to accept the same for a particular purpose unless it approves the terms and
3	conditions attaching thereto;
4	(j) to enter into contracts, establish trusts, act as trustee, solely or
5	jointly with any other person, and employ and act through agents;
6	(k) to erect, provide, equip and maintain libraries, laboratories,
7	lecture halls, halls of residence, refectories, sports grounds, playing fields
8	and other buildings or things necessary, suitable or convenient for any of
9	the objects of the University;
10	(l) to hold public lectures and to undertake printing, publishing
11	and book selling;
12	(m) subject to any limitations or conditions imposed by statute, to
13	invest any moneys appertaining to the University by way of endowment it,
14	not being immediately required for current expenditure. in any
15	investments, not being immediately required for current expenditure, in
16	any investments or securities or in the purchase or improvement of land,
17	with power from time to time, to vary any such investments to deposit any
18	moneys for the time being not invested with any bank on deposit or current
19	account;
20	(n) to borrow, whether on interest or not and if need be upon the
21	security of any or all of the property, movable or immovable, of the
22	University, such moneys as the Council may from time to time in its
23	discretion find it necessary or expedient to borrow or to guarantee any loan,
24	advances or credit facilities;
25	(o) to make gifts for any charitable purpose;
26	(p) to do anything which it is authorized or required by this Act or
27	by statute to do; and
28	(q) to do all such acts or things, whether or not incidental to the
29	foregoing powers, as may advance the objects of the University.
30	(2) Subject to the provisions of this Act and of the statutes and

1	without prejudice to section 7 (2) of this Act, the powers conferred on the
2	University by subsection (1) of this section shall be exercisable on behalf of
3	the University by the Council or by the Senate or in many other manner
4	which may be authorised by the statute.
5	(3) The power of the University to establish further campuses and
6	colleges within the University shall be exercisable by statute and not
7	otherwise.
8	4(1) The Chancellor shall, in relation to the University, take
9	precedence before all other members of the University, and when he is
10	present, shall preside at all meetings of Convocation held for conferring
11	degrees.
12	(2) The Pro-Chancellor Shall, in relation to the University, take
13	precedence before all other members of the University, except the
14	Chancellor and except the Vice-Chancellor when acting as chairman of
15	Congregation or Convocation and the Pro-Chancellor shall, when he is
16	present, be the chairman at all meetings of the Council,
17	5. The Council of the University shall consist of-
18	(a) the Pro-Chancellor;
19	(b) the Vice-Chancellor; University.
20	(c) the Deputy Vice-Chancellor;
21	(d) one person from the Ministry responsible for education;
22	(e) nine persons representing a variety of interests, and broadly,
23	representatives of the whole Federation to be appointed by the President;
24	(f) four persons appointed by the Senate from among its members;
25	(g) two persons appointed by Congregation from among its
26	members;
27	(h) one person appointed by convocation from among its members.
28	6. -(1) Subject to the provisions of this Act relating to the Visitor,
29	the Council shall be the governing body of the University and shall be
30	charged with the general control and superintendence of the policy,

1 finances and property of the University. 2 (2) There shall be a committee of the Council, to be known as the 3 Finance and General Purposes Committee, which shall, subject to the directions of the Council, exercise control over the property and expenditure of 4 5 the University and perform such other functions of the Council as the Council 6 may from time to time delegate to it. 7 (3) Provision shall be made by statute with respect to the constitution of the Finance and General Purposes Committee. 8 9 (4) The Council shall ensure that proper accounts of the University 10 are kept and that the accounts of the University are audited annually by an independent firm of auditors approved by the Council and that an annual report 11 is published by the University together with certified copies of the said 12 13 accounts as audited. 14 (5) Subject to this Act and the statutes, the Council and the Finance and General Purposes Committee may each make rules for the purpose of 15 exercising any of their respective functions or of regulating their own 16 17 procedure. (6) Rules made under subsection (5) of this section by the Finance and 18 General Purposes Committee shall not come into force unless approved by the 19 20 Council; and in so far and to the extent that any rules so made by that Committee conflict with any direction given by the Council. whether before or 21 after the coming into force of the rules in question, the directions of the Council 22 23 shall prevail. (7) There shall be paid to the members respectively of the Council, the 24 Finance and General Purposes Committee and of any other 25 committee set up by the Council, allowances in respect of travelling and other 26

27 reasonable expenses, at such rates as may from time to time be fixed by the28 Minister.

(8) The Council shall meet as and when necessary for theperformance of its functions under this Act and shall meet at least three times

in every year.
(9) If requested in writing by any five members of the Council, the
chairman shall within 28 days after the receipt of such request call a meeting
of the Council.
(10) Any request made under sub-section (9) of this section shall
specify the business to be considered at the meeting and no business not so
specified shall be transacted at that meeting.
7(1) Subject to section 6 of this Act and subsections (3) aid (4) of
this section and the provisions of this Act relating to the Visitor, it shall be
the general function of the Senate to organise and control the teaching by the
University, the admission of student where no other enactment provides to
the contrary and the discipline of students; and to promote research at the
University.
(2) Without prejudice to the generality of subsection (I) of this
section and subject as there mentioned, it shall in particular be the function
of the Senate to make provision for-
(a) the establishment, organisation and control of campuses,
colleges, schools, institutes and other teaching and research units of the
University and the allocation of responsibility for different branches of
learning;
(b) the organisation and control of courses of study at the
University and of the examinations held in conjunction with those courses,
including the appointment of examiners, both internal and external;
(c) the award of degrees, and such other qualifications as may be
prescribed in connection with examinations held as aforesaid;

26 (d) the making of recommendations to the Council with respect to
27 the award to any person of an honorary fellowship or honorary degree or the
28 title of professor emeritus;

29 (e) the establishment, organisation and control of halls or residence30 and similar institutions at the University;

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1	(f) the supervision of the welfare of students at the university and the
2	regulation of their conduct;
3	(g) the granting of fellowships, scholarships, prizes and similar
4	awards in so far as the awards are within the control of the University; and
5	(h) determining what descriptions of dress shall be academic dress for
6	the purposes of the University, and regulating the use of academic dress,
7	(3) The Senate shall not establish any new campus, college, school,
8	department, institute or other teaching and research units of the university, or
9	any hall of residence or similar institution at the University without the
10	approval of the Council.
11	(4) Subject to this Act and the statutes, the Senate may make
12	regulations for the purpose of exercising any function conferred on it either by
13	the foregoing provisions of this section Of otherwise or for the purpose of
14	making provision for any matter for which provision by regulations is
15	authorized or required by this Act or by statute.
16	(5) Regulations shall provide that at least one of the persons appointed
17	as the examiners at each final or professional examination held in conjunction
18	with any course of study at the University is not a teacher at the university but is
19	a teacher of the branch of learning to which the course relates at some other
20	university of high repute or a person engaged in practising the profession in a
21	reputable organisation or institution.
22	(6) Subject to a right or appeal to the Council from a decision of the
23	Senate under this sub-section, the Senate may deprive any person of any
24	degree, diploma or other award of the University which has been conferred
25	upon him if after due enquiry he is shown to have been guilty of dishonourable
26	or scandalous conduct in gaining admission into the University or obtaining
27	that award.
28	8(1) The Vice-Chancellor shall, in relation to the University, take
20	precedence before all other members of the University except the Chancellor

29 precedence before all other members of the University except the Chancellor and subject to section 4 of this Act except the Pro-Chancellor and any other 30

1	person for the time being acting as chairman of the Council.
2	(2) Subject to sections 6, 7 and 14 of this Act, the Vice-Chancellor
3	shall have the general function, in addition to any other functions conferred
4	on him by this Act or otherwise of directing the activities of the University
5	and shall be the chief executive and accounting officer of the University and
6	ex-officio chairman of the Senate,
7	PART II - TRANSFER OF PROPERTY, ETC, TO THE UNIVERSITY
8	9(1) All property held by or on behalf of the provisional council of
9	the University shall, by virtue of this sub-section and without further
10	assurance, vest in the University and be held by it for the purpose of the
11	University,
12	(2) The provisions of the Second Schedule to this Act shall have
13	effect with respect to, and to matters arising from, the transfer of property
14	by this section and with respect to the other matters mentioned in that
15	Schedule.
16	PART III - STATUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY
17	10(1) Subject to his Act, the University may make statutes for any
18	of the following purposes, that is to say-
19	(a) Making provision with respect to the composition and
20	constitution of any authority of the University;
21	(b) Specifying and regulating the powers and duties of any
22	authority of the University, and regulating any other matter connected with
23	the University or any of its authorities;
24	(c) Regulating the admission of students (where no other
25	enactment provides to the contrary), and their discipline and welfare;
26	(d) Determining whether any particular matter is to be treated as an
27	academic or non-academic matter for the purposes of this Act and of any
28	statute, regulation or other instrument made thereunder; or
29	(e) Making provision for any other matter for which provision by
30	statute is authorised or required by this Act.

1	(2) Subject to section 2 of this Act, the Interpretation Act shall apply
2	in relation to any statute made under this section as it applies to a
3	subsidiary instrument within the meaning of section $29(1)$ of that Act.
4	(3) The Statute contained in the Third Schedule to this Act shall be
5	deemed to have come into force on the commencement of this Act and shall be
6	deemed to have been made under this section by each University.
7	(4) The power to make statutes conferred by this section shall not be
8	prejudiced or limited in any way by reason of the inclusion or omission of any
9	matter in or from the statue contained in the Third Schedule to this Act or any
10	subsequent statue.
11	11(1) The power of each University to make statutes shall be
12	exercised in accordance with the provisions of this section and not otherwise.
13	(2) A proposed statute shall not become law unless it has been
14	approved-
15	(a) at a meeting of the Senate, by the votes of not less than two thirds
16	of the members present and voting; and
17	(b) at a meeting of the Council, by the votes of not less than two thirds
18	of the members present and voting.
19	(3) A proposed statute may originate either in the Senate or in the
20	Council, and may be approved as required by subsection (2) of this section by
21	either one of those bodies or the other.
22	(4) A statute which-
23	(a) makes provision for or alters the composition or constitution of the
24	Council, the Senate or any other authority of the University; or
25	(b) provides for the establishment of a new campus or college or for
26	the amendment or revocation of any statute whereby a campus or college is
27	established, shall not corne into operation unless it has been approved by the
28	President.
29	(5) For the purpose of section 2 (2) of the Interpretation act, a statute
30	shall be treated as being made on the date on which it is duly approved by the

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1	Council after having been duly approved by the Senate, or on the date on
2	which it is duly approved by the Senate after having been duly approved by
3	the Council, as the case may be or, in the case of a statute falling within
4	subsection (4) of this section, on the date on which it is approved by the
5	President.
6	(6) In the event of any doubt or dispute arising at any time-
7	(a) as to the meaning of any provision of a statute; or
8	(b) as to whether any matter is for the purposes of this Act an
9	academic or non-academic matter as they relate to such doubt or dispute, the
10	matter may be referred to the Visitor, who shall take such advice and make
11	such decision thereon as he shall think fit.
12	(7) The decision of the Visitor on any matter referred to him under
13	sub-section (6) of this section shall be binding upon the authorities, staff and
14	students of the University and where any question as to the meaning of any
15	provision of a statute has been decided by the Visitor under that sub-section,
16	no question as to the meaning of that provision shall be entertained by any
17	court of law in Nigeria.
18	(8) Nothing in sub-section (7) of this section shall affect any power
19	of a court of competent jurisdiction to determine whether any provision of a
20	statute is wholly or partly void as being ultra vires or as being inconsistent
21	with the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999.
22	12. A statute may be proved in any court by the
23	production of a copy thereof bearing or having affixed to it a certificate
24	purporting to be signed by the Vice-chancellor or the secretary to the
25	Council to the effect that the copy is a true copy of a statue of the University.
26	PART IV - SUPERVISION AND DISCIPLINE
27	13(1) The President shall be the Visitor of the University,
28	(2) The Visitor shall as alien as the circumstances may require, not
29	being less than once every five years, conduct a visitation of the University
30	or direct that such a visitation be conducted by such person or persons as the

1	Visitor may deem fit and in respect of any of the affairs of the University.
2	(3) It shall be the duty of the bodies and persons comprising the
3	University to make available to the Visitor and to any other person conducting a
4	visitation in pursuance of this section, such facilities and assistance as he or
5	they may reasonably require for the purposes of a visitation.
6	14 (1) It appears to the Council that a member of the Council (other than the
7	Pro-Chancellor or the Vice-chancellor) should be removed from office on the
8	ground of misconduct or inability to perform the functions of his office or
9	employment, the Council shall make a recommendation to that effect through
10	the Minister to the President, and the President, after making such enquiries (if
11	any) as he may consider appropriate approves the recommendation, he may
12	direct the removal of the person in question from office.
13	(2) It shall be the duty of the Minister to use his best endeavours to
14	cause a copy of the instrument embodying a direction under subsection (1) of
15	this section to be served as soon as reasonably practicable on the person to
16	whom it relates.
17	15(1) It if appears to the Council that there are reasons for believing
18	that any person employed as a member of the academic, administrative
19	or professional staff of the University, other than the Vice-chancellor,
20	should be administrative removed from his office or employment on the
21	ground of misconduct or of inability to perform the functions of his office or
22	employment, the Council shall-
23	(a) give notice of those reasons to the person in question;
24	(b) afford him an opportunity of making representations in person on
25	the matter by the Council; and
26	(c) for the person in question to be afforded an opportunity of
27	appearing before and being heard by the investigating committee with respect
28	to the matter, and if the Council, after considering the report of the
29	investigating committee, is satisfied that the person in question should be

30 removed as aforesaid, the Council may so remove him by an instrument in

1	writing signed on the directions of the Council.
2	(2) The Vice-chancellor may, in a case of misconduct by a member
3	of the staff which in the opinion of the Vice-chancellor is prejudicial to the
4	interest of the university, suspend such member and any such suspension
5	shall forthwith be reported to the Council.
6	(3) For good cause, any member of the staff may be suspended
7	from his duties or his appointment may be terminated by the Council; and
8	for the purposes of this subsection" good cause" means-
9	(a) conviction for any offence which the Council considers to be
10	such as to render the person concerned unfit for the discharge of the
11	functions of his office; or
12	(b) any physical or mental incapacity which the Council, after
13	obtaining medical advice, considers to be such as to render the person
14	concerned unfit to continue to hold his office; or
15	(c) conduct of a scandalous or other disgraceful nature which the
16	Council considers to be such as to render the person concerned unfit to
17	continue to hold his office; or
18	(d) conduce which the Council considers to be such as to constitute
19	failure or inability of the person concerned to discharge the functions of his
20	office or to comply with the terms and conditions of his service; or
21	(e) conduct which the Council considers to be generally of such
22	nature as to render the continued appointment or service of the person
23	concerned prejudicial or detrimental to the interest of the University.
24	(4) Any person suspended pursuant to subsection (2) or (3) of this
25	section shall be on half pay and the Council shall before the expiration of a
26	period of three months after the date of such suspension consider the case
27	against that person and come to a decision as-
28	(a) whether to continue such person's suspension and if so on what
29	terms (including the proportion of his emoluments to be paid to him);
30	(b) whether to reinstate such person, in which case the Council

1	shall restore his full emoluments to him with effect from the date of suspension;
2	(c) whether to terminate the appointment of the person concerned, in
3	which case such a person shall not be entitled to the proportion of his
4	emoluments withheld during the period of suspension; or
5	d) whether to take such lesser disciplinary action against such person
6	(including the restoration of such proportion of his emoluments that might
7	have been withheld) as the Council may determine.
8	(5) In any case where the Council, pursuant to this section, decides to
9	continue a person's suspension or decides to take further disciplinary action
10	against a person. The Council shall before the expiration of a period of three
11	months from such decision come to a final determination in respect of the case
12	concerning any such person.
13	(6) It shall be the duty of the person by whom an instrument of
14	removal is signed in pursuance of subsection (1) of this section to use his best
15	endeavours to cause a copy of the instrument to be served as soon as reasonably
16	practicable on the person to whom it relates.
17	(7) Nothing in the foregoing provisions of this section shall -
18	(a) apply to any directive given by the Visitor in consequence of any
19	visitation; or
20	(b) prevent tile Council from making regulations for the discipline of
21	other categories of workers of the University as may be prescribed.
22	16(1) If on the recommendation of the Senate. it appears to the Vice-
23	Chancellor that person appointed as an examiner for any examination of the
24	University ought to be removed from his office or appointment. then. except in
25	such cases as may be prescribed by the Vice-chancellor may. after affording the
26	examiner an opportunity of making representations in person on the matter to
27	the Vice-chancellor.remove the examiner from the appointment by an
28	instrument in writing signed by the Vice-chancellor.
29	(2) Subject to the provisions of regulations made in pursuance of
30	section (5) of this Act, the Vice-chancellor may, on the recommendation of the

30 section (5) of this Act, the Vice-chancellor may. on the recommendation of the

1	Senate, appoint an appropriate person as examiner in the place of the
2	examiner removed in pursuance of subsection (1) of this section.
3	(3) It shall be the duty of the Vice-chancellor.on signing an
4	instrumentof removal pursuance of this section, to use his best endeavours
5	to cause a copy of the instrument to be served as soon as reasonably
6	practicable on the person to whom it related.
7	17 (1) Subject to the provisions of this section, where it appears to
8	the Vice-chancellor that any student of the University has been guilty of
9	misconduct, the Vice-chancellor may, without prejudice to any other
9 10	disciplinary powers conferred on him by statute or regulations, direct -
	(a) that the student shall not, during such period as may be specified
11 12	in the directions, participate in such activities of the University, or make use
13	of such facilities of the University, as may be so specified; or
14	(b) that the activities of the student shall, during such period as may
15	be specified in the direction, be restricted in such manner as may be so
16	specified, or
17	(c) that the student be rusticated for such period as may be specified
18	in the direction; or
19	(d) that the student be expelled from the University.
20	(2) Where a direction is given under subsection $(1)(c)$ or (d) of this
21	section in respect of any student, that student may, within the prescribed
22	period and in the prescribed manner, appeal to the Council; and where such
23	an appeal is brought, the Council shall, after causing such inquiry to be made
24	in the matter as the Council considers just? either confirm or set aside the
25	direction or modify it in such manner as the Council thinks fit.
26	(3) The fact that an appeal from a direction is brought in pursuance
27	of subsection (2) of this section shall not affect the operation of the direction
28	while the appeal is pending.
29	(4) The Vice-chancellor may delegate his powers under this
30	section to a disciplinary board consisting of such members of the University

1	as he may nominate.
2	(5) Nothing

2 (5) Nothing in this section shall be construed as preventing the
restriction or termination of a student's activities at the University otherwise
than on the ground of misconduct.

5 (6) A direction under subsection (1) (a) of this section may be 6 combined with a direction under subsection (1) (b) of this section.

7	PART V - MISCELLANEOUS AND GENERAL
8	18. -(1) No person shall be required to satisfy requirements as to any of

the following matters. that is to say, race (including ethnic grouping), sex, place of birth or of family origin, or religious or political persuasion, as a condition of becoming or continuing to be a student at the university, the holder of any degree of the University or of any appointment or employment at the University, or a member of any body established by virtue of this Act; and no person shall be subject to any disadvantage or accorded any advantage relating to the University, by reference to any of those matters.

16 (2) Nothing in subsection (1) of this section shall be construed as 17 preventing, the University from imposing any disability or restriction on any 18 of the persons mentioned in that subsection where such person willfully refuses 19 or fails on grounds of religious belief to undertake any duty generally and 20 uniformly imposed on all such person or any group of them which duty, having 21 regard to its nature and the special circumstances pertaining thereto, is in the 22 opinion of the University reasonably justifiable in the national interest.

19. Without prejudice to the provisions of the Land Use Act, the
University shall not dispose of or charge any land or an interest in any land
(including any land transferred to the University by this Act) except with the
prior written consent, either general or special, of the President:

27 Provided that such consent shall not be required in the case of any
28 lease or tenancy at a rack-rent for a term not exceeding 21 years or any lease or
29 tenancy to a member of the University for residential purpose.

30 **20.** Except as may be otherwise provided by statute or by regulations,

1	the quorum and procedure of any body of persons established by this Act
2	shall be as bodies determined by that body.
3	21(I) Any body of persons established by this Act shall, without
4	prejudice to the generality of the powers of that body, have power to appoint
5	committees, which need not consist exclusively of members of that body
6	and to authorise, committee established by it-
7	(a) to exercise, on its behalf, such of its functions as it may
8	determine;
9	(b) to co-opt members, and
10	(2) Any two or more such bodies may arrange for the holding of
11	joint meetings of those bodies, or for the appointment of committees
