Yusuf Adamu Gagdi Γ Commencement ENACTED by the National Assembly of the Federal Republic of Nigeria: PART I - ESTABLISHMENT AND OBJECTIVES OF THE INSTITUTE 1 2 1.-(1) There is established the National Institute for Police Studies Establishment of National (in this Act referred to as "the Institute"). Institute for Police 3 Studies 4 (2) The Institute: (a) is a body corporate with perpetual succession and a common 5 seal; 6 7 (b) may sue and be sued in its corporate name; and (c) may acquire, hold or dispose of property whether moveable or 8 9 immoveable. 2. The objectives of the Institute are to: 10 Objectives of the Institute (a) be a leading centre for the provision of competence and 11 enhanced training for middle and top level managers of security in order to 13 advance the best practices in conflict prevention, mitigation and resolution; (b) contribute uniquely and viably, to the promotion of inter-14 service, inter-agency and international cooperation, collaboration and 15 harmony among intelligence, security and law enforcement agencies locally 17 and globally in order to achieve national security, regional and global peace; (c) serve as a critical centre for research and dialogue where 18

	9	(2) Nigerian Police is the leading institute in research into types,
	10	trends, patterns, methodology and typologies into criminal behaviour, criminal
	11	activities, modus operandi, psycho-analysis, profiling of criminals affecting
	12	the internal security of Nigeria.
	13	(3) In addition to any other area of security interest, the Institute shall
	14	focus on terrorism, insurgency, subversion, espionage and sabotage as basic
	15	threats to Nigeria's internal security.

No, 4, 2014 8 the Pensions Reform Act, with the exception of those on secondment and 9 accordingly, officers and other persons employed in the Institute are, in respect 10 of their service in the Institute, be entitled to pension, gratuities and other retirement benefits as are prescribed under that Act and nothing in this Act 11 12 prevents the appointment of a person to any office on terms which preclude the 13 grant of a pension or gratuity in respect of that office. Appointment 14 13.-(1) The Board shall appoint a Directing Staff (DS) of the Institute and functions of directing staff for a term not exceeding two years. 15 (2) The Directing Staff is responsible to the Director of Studies for 16 17 supervising and guiding the academic programme of course participants, 18 preside in syndicate discussions, lead in study tours and any other duty as may be assigned by the Director of Studies. 19 20 14.-(1) There shall be appointed for the Institute a retired Appointment and functions of Dean of the Ambassador, security intelligence experts or Vice-Chancellors with vast 21 Institute intelligence in security risk management, conflict resolution and human 22 23 security to be known as the Dean within the Institute. 24 (2) The Board shall, on the recommendation of the Inspector General of Police Nigerian Police, appoint the Dean of the Institute. 25 (3) The Dean of the Institute shall hold office on such terms and 26 conditions as may be specified in his letter of appointment as may be 27 determined by the Board with the approval of the Management of the Nigerian 28 29 Police, but the aggregate of his tenure as Dean of the Institute shall not exceed eight years. 30

1	(4) The Dean, in addition to deputising for the Director General of	
2	the Institute, is responsible for:	
3	(a) organising and conducting the courses, studies and programs	
4	undertaken in their respective areas of specialisation by the Institute;	
5	(b) the collation and publication of course materials and other

7	(c) advisory role to the Board in the recruitment of credible and

9	(d) any other assignment that the Board and Director of the	
10	Institute may from time to time deem necessary for the achievement of the	
11	objectives of the Institute.	
12	PART V - FINANCIAL PROVISIONS	
13	15(1) The Institute shall establish and maintain a fund (in this Act	Fund of the
14	referred to as "the Fund") from which shall be defrayed all expenditure	Institute
15	reasonably incurred by the Institute.	
16	(2) There shall be paid and credited to the Fund:	
17	(a) money as may in each year be approved by the National	
18	Assembly for the purpose of the activities of the Institute;	
19	(b) grants as is provided by the Tertiary Education Trust Fund,	
20	notwithstanding anything contained in any other law;	
21	(c) all sums charged for services rendered by he Institute;	
22	(d) all other sums that may accrue to the Institute from any other	
23	source, including gifts referred to in section 16.	
24	16. The Institute may accept gifts of land, money or other property,	Power to accept
25	within or outside Nigeria, upon such terms and conditions, if any, as may be	gifts
26	specified by the person or organisation making the gift provided that the	
27	terms and conditions are not contrary to the objectives and functions of the	
28	Institute under this Act nor inimical to national interests.	
29	17. The Institute may, subject to the approval of the Board, with	Power to borrow
30	the consent or general authority given by the Federal Government, borrow	

	1	by way of loan, from any lawful source, money required by the Institute for
	2	meeting its obligations and performing its functions under this Act, but where
	3	the sum or the aggregate of the sums involved at any one time does not exceed
	4	N5,000,000.00, no such consent or authority is required.
Investment t	5	18. The Institute may, subject to the approval of the Board, invest any
	6	surplus funds of the Institute in such securities as may be approved by the
	7	Management of the Nigerian Police and the Federal Government.
Audit	8	19. The Institute shall keep proper accounts in a form, which
	9	conforms to accepted commercial standards of its receipt, payments, assets and
	10	liabilities and shall submit the accounts annually for auditing by a qualified
	11	auditor appointed from the list of auditors and in accordance with the
	12	guidelines supplied by the Auditor-General for the Federation.
Annual estimates,	13	20(1) The Institute shall, not later than 30th September of each year,
accounts and annual reports	14	submit to National Assembly a report on its activities during the immediate
	15	presiding year, the audited account of the Institute.

12	Section 4 (6)	
13	Proceedings of the Board	
14	1(1) Subject to this Act and Section 27 of the Interpretation Act	
15	(which provides for the decisions of a statutory body to be taken by the	
16	majority of the members of the body and for the persons presiding to have a	
17	second or casting vote), the Board may make standing orders regulating the	
18	proceedings of a Board and its Committee.	
19	(2) The quorum of the Board shall be Chairman and four other	
20	members, and the quorum of any committee of the Board shall be	
21	determined by the Board.	
22	2(1) The Board shall meet at least two times in each year and,	
23	whenever it is summoned by the Chairman, and if the Chairman is required	
24	to do so by notice given to him by at least three other members, he shall	
25	summon a meeting of the board to be held within seven days from the date on	
26	which the notice is given.	
27	(2) At any meeting of the Board, the Chairman shall preside but if	
28	he is absent, the Inspector General of Police, Nigerian Police or any other

30	(3) Where the Board wishes to obtain the advice of any person on	

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- any particular matter, the Board may co-opt him as a member for such period as it deems fit, but a person who is a member by virtue of this subparagraph is not entitled to vote at any meeting of the Board and shall not count towards a quorum.
- 3.-(1) The Board may set up one or more committees to perform on
   behalf of the Board, such functions as the Board may determine.
  - (2) A committee appointed under this paragraph shall consist of such number of persons as may be determined by the Board and not more than one third of those persons may be persons who are not members of the Board.
    - (3) a person other than a member of the Board shall hold office on the committee in accordance with the terms of the instrument of his appointment.
  - (4) A decision of a committee of the Board is of no effect until it is confirmed by the Board.

#### EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM

This Bill seeks to establish the National Institute for Police Studies (NISS) charged with the responsibility for, among other things, the administration and management of the Institute and determining the standards of knowledge and skill to be attained by personnel of the Institute.
