AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF FEDERAL UNIVERSITY

OF HEALTH SCIENCES OTUKPO, AND FOR MATTERS CONNECTED **THEREWITH** Sponsored by Senator Abba Moro Commencement ENACTED by the National Assembly of the Federal Republic of Nigeria as follows-1.-(1) The College of Health Sciences, Otukpo Campus listed in 1 Separation of Campus of Health paragraph (a) of this subsection shall be separated from the Federal 2 Sciences University of Agriculture, Makurdi, as follows, that is-3 (a) The College of Health Sciences, Otukpo Campus, from the 4 5 Federal University of Agriculture, Makurdi. 6 (2) The Campus of Health Sciences so separated under subsection 7 (1) of this section shall be known and referred to by the name specified 8 herein, that is - College of Health Sciences, Otukpo Campus, as the Federal 9 University of Health Sciences, Otukpo. 2.-(1) There is hereby established the Federal University of Health 10 Establishment and Objects of Sciences, Otukpo, Benue State. the Federal 11 University of Health Sciences (2) The University shall be a body corporate with perpetual 12 succession and a common seal and may sue and be sued in its corporate 13 name and shall have power to acquire, hold and dispose of movable 14 15 properties. (3) By this enactment, the College of Health Sciences, Federal 16 17 University of Agriculture, Makurdi, Otukpo, Campus ceases to exist and is subsumed by the Federal University of Health Sciences, Otukpo 18 19 (4) The general objects/purposes of the University shall be to-(a) Encourage the advancement of learning and to hold out to all 20

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- 1 persons without distinction of race, creed, sex or political conviction, the 2 opportunity of acquiring a higher education in Medicine and other Health 3 Sciences;
- (b) Develop and offer academic and professional programs leading to the award of diplomas, first degrees, postgraduate research and higher degrees with emphasis on planning, adaptive, technical, maintenance, developmental and productive skills in the field of Medicine, biomedical engineering, scientific, and allied professional disciplines relating to health resources with the aim of producing socially mature persons with capacity not only to 10 understand, use and adapt existing technologies in the health industry, but also to improve on those disciplines and develop new ones, and to contribute to the 11 12 scientific transformation of medical and other health practices in Nigeria;
  - (c) Act as agents and catalysts, through postgraduate training, research and innovation for the effective and economic utilization, exploitation and conservation of Nigeria's natural, economic and human resources;
  - (d) Offer to the general population, as a form of public service, the results of training and research in medicine and allied disciplines and to foster the practical application of those results;
- (e) Establish appropriate relationships with other national institutions 19 20 involved in training, research and development of healthcare;
- (f) Identify the health problems and needs of Nigeria and to find 21 22 solutions to them within the context of overall national development;
  - (g) Provide and promote sound basic scientific training as a foundation for the development of medicine and allied disciplines, taking into account indigenous culture, the need to enhance national unity, the need to vastly increase the practical content of student training, and adequate preparation of graduates for self-employment in medicine and allied professions;
- 29 (h) Promote and emphasize teaching, research and extension of health knowledge, including health extension services and outreach programs, in-30

2	(i) Offer academic programs in relation to the training of

10	(m) Undertake any other Activities appropriate for a University of
11	Health Sciences.
12	(5) The University has the mandate to-
13	(i) Teach and train high caliber health-care professionals;
14	(ii) provide healthcare services and consultancy;
15	(iii) conduct research and participate in extension, outreach and
16	community services;
17	(iv) operate various schools and specialties that offer exemplary
18	training and quality research in health care;
19	(v) facilitate the acquisition of knowledge and skills in different
20	specialties for effective and efficient management of health care;
21	(vi) provide solution to the lack and the inequitable distribution of
22	health professionals serving rural communities;
23	(vii) train clinically, competent and socially conscious health
24	workers who will stay and serve in depressed and undeserved communities
25	especially in the rural areas of Nigeria;
26	(viii) develop a training model for the training of community
27	oriented health workers that could be replicated in other areas of Nigeria;
28	(ix) facilitate collaboration and enhancement of health sciences
29	research and education endeavors;
30	(x) advance the national and international reputation as the premier

university for health sciences education and research in Nigeria;

5	other buildings or things necessary or suitable or convenient for any of the

7	(l) to hold public lectures and to undertake printing, publishing and
8	book-selling;
9	(m) subject to any limitations on conditions imposed by statute, to
10	invest any money appertaining to the University by way of endowment, not
11	being immediately required for current expenditure, in any investments or
12	securities or the purchase or improvement of land, with power from time to
13	time to vary any such investments and to deposit any money for the time being
14	not invested with any bank on deposit or current account;
15	(n) to borrow, whether on interest or not if need be upon the security of
16	any or all of the property, movable or immovable, of the University, such
17	moneys as the Council may, from time to time, in its discretion find it necessary
18	or expedient to borrow or to guarantee any loan, advances or credit facilities;
19	(o) to do anything which it is authorized or required by this Bill or by
20	statute to do; and
21	(p) to do all such acts or things, incidental to the foregoing powers, as
22	may advance the objects of the University.
23	(2) Subject to the provisions of this Bill and of the statutes and without
24	prejudice to section 9 (2) of this Bill, the powers conferred on the University by
25	subsection (1) of this section shall be exercisable on behalf of the University by
26	the Council or by the Senate or in any other manner, which may be authorized
27	by statute.
28	(3) The power of the University to establish further campuses and
29	colleges within the University shall be exercisable by statute and not
30	otherwise.

Functions of the Council and its Finance and General Purposes Committee **8.**-(1)Subject to the provisions of this Bill relating to the Visitor, the Council shall be the governing body of each University and shall be charged with the general control and superintendence of the policy, finance and property of the University.

(2)There shall be a committee of the Council to be known as the Finance and General Purposes Committee, which shall, subject to the directions of the Council, exercise control over the property and expenditure of the University and perform such other functions of the Council as the Council may, from time to time, delegate to it.

(3) Provision shall be made by statute with respect to the constitution of the Finance and General Purposes Committee.

(4)The Council shall ensure that proper accounts of the University are kept and that the accounts of the University are audited annually by an independent firm of auditors approved by the Council, and that an annual report shall be published by the University together with certified copies of the said accounts as audited.

(5)Subject to this Bill and the statutes, the Council and the Finance and General Purposes Committee may each make rules for regulating their own procedure.

(6)Rules made under subsection (5) of this section by the Finance and General Purposes Committee shall not come into force unless approved by the Council; and in so far and to the extent that any rules so made by that Committee conflict with any directions given by the Council (whether before or after the coming into force of the rules in question), the direction of the Council shall prevail.

(7) There shall be paid to the members of the Council, the Finance and General Purposes Committee respectively and of any other committee set up by the Council an allowance in respect of travelling and other reasonable expenses, at such rates as may, from time to time, be fixed by the Minister.

(8) The Council shall meet as and when necessary for the performance

of its functions under this Bill and shall meet at least three times in every

Removal of certain Members of Council 1

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16.-(1)If it appears to the Council that a member of the Council (other than the Pro-Chancellor or the Vice-Chancellor) should be removed from office on the ground of misconduct or inability to perform the functions of his office or employment, the Council shall make a recommendation to that effect through the Minister to the President after making such enquiry, if any, as may be considered appropriate, and if the President approves the recommendation he may direct the removal of the person in question from office.

(2) It shall be the duty of the Minister to use his best endeavor to cause a copy of the instrument embodying a direction under subsection (1) of this section to be served as soon as reasonably practicable on the person to whom it relates.

Removal and Discipline of Academic, Administrative and Professional Staff 17.-(1)If it appears to the Council that there are reasons for believing that any person employed as a member of the academic, administrative or professional staff of the University, other than Vice-Chancellor, should be removed from his office or employment on the ground of misconduct or of inability to perform the functions of his office or employment, the Council shall-

- (a) give notice of those reasons to the person in question; afford him an opportunity of making representations in person on the matter;
  - (b) appoint a Staff Disciplinary Committee;
- (c) and if the Council, after considering the report of the Staff Disciplinary Committee, is satisfied that the person in question should be removed as aforesaid, the Council may so remove him by an instrument in writing signed on the directions of the Council.
  - (2) The Vice-Chancellor may, in case of misconduct by a member of staff, which in the opinion of the Vice-Chancellor is prejudicial to the interests of the University, suspend such member and any such suspension shall forthwith be reported to the Council.
- 29 (3) For good cause, any member of staff may be suspended from his 30 duties or his appointment may be terminated by the Council; and for the

I	purposes of this subsection "good cause" means-
2	(a)conviction for any offence which the Council considers to be
3	such as to render the person concerned unfit for the discharge of the
4	functions of his office;
5	(b) any physical or mental incapacity which the Council, after
6	obtaining medical advice, considers to be such as to render the person
7	concerned unfit to continue to hold his office;
8	(c) conduct of a scandalous or other disgraceful nature which the
9	Council considers to be such as to render the person concerned unfit to

21	(a) whether to continue such person's suspension and if so on what
22	terms (including the proportion. of his emoluments to be paid to him);
23	(b) whether to re-instate such person in which case the Council
24	shall restore his full emoluments with effect from the date of suspension;
25	(c) whether to terminate the appointment of the person concerned
26	in which case such person shall not be entitled to the proportion of his
27	emoluments withheld during the period of suspension; or
28	(e) whether to take such lesser disciplinary action against such
29	person (including the restoration of such proportion of his emoluments as
30	might have been withheld) as the Council may determine.

	1	(5) In any case where the Council, pursuant to this section, decides to
	2	continue a person's suspension or decides to take further disciplinary action
	3	against a person, the Council shall before the expiration of a period of three
	4	months from such decision come to a final determination in respect of the case
	5	concerning any such person.
	6	(6) It shall be the duty of the person by whom an instrument of
	7	removal is signed in pursuance of subsection (1) of this section to use his best
	8	endeavor to cause a copy of the instrument to be served as soon as reasonably
	9	practicable on the person to whom it relates.

2	16(1) The Finance and General Purposes Committee of the Council

7	(c) six other members of the Council appointed by the Council, two of
8	whom shall be selected from among the three members of the Council

1	(3) The quorum of the Senate shall be one quarter (or the nearest
